Some prefer the in-person assessment option and the deep connections you build with fellow students and staff. We are committed to returning to in-person gatherings and are here to support you during this transition.




# Midwives of Excelence

#### ANNUAL CAMPUS SECURITY REPORT

MCU prioritizes the safety and well-being of its students, employees and visitors whether that's online or in person. The Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act, commonly referred to as the Clery Act, requires higher education institutions to collect, report and disseminate crime data to the campus community and U.S. Department of Education; to provide timely warnings of reported crimes that represent a threat to the safety of students or employees; and to make public their campus security policies.

#### **Giving Tuesday**

Giving Tuesday has been established in recent years as an opportunity to take a break from the consumerism of the holiday season and focus on giving back to our communities. This year, our goal was to spread the word that MCU is training leaders to fill in the gaps left by maternity care deserts.

Since our founding, we've trained over 2,375 midwives. Midwives like MCU alumna, Amanda Counter:


"The upcoming closure of the labor and delivery unit at Evanston Regional Hospital in Evanston, Wyoming, highlights the growing crisis of maternity care deserts. Families in Uinta County will soon face drives of well over an hour for hospital-based maternity care.

As community midwives, our role has always been to offer choices, not limits. I care deeply about hospital closures because maternity care is not one-size-fits-all. Some people need an OB; some need a hospital. No one should be forced into birthing in a car, at home, or alone simply because they have no other options.

Although I'm located nearly 90 minutes from Evanston, I've reprioritized my travel radius and been accepted as a Wyoming Medicaid provider. I stand ready to serve families in Uinta County and beyond. This is what not abandoning rural families looks like. This is the heart of midwifery."

A sincere thanks to everyone who shared our video and made a gift to the Scholarship Fund this Giving Tuesday. Because of your efforts, we were able to raise over \$100 and spread awareness of the important work of midwives in our communities. This is how we save lives, one birth at a time. Thank you!

#### **Clinical Handbook Updates**

We're excited to share that the MCU Clinical Handbook has been updated! Be sure to check out the latest version for the most current policies and expectations for our clinical program—it's your go-to guide for success!

Also, the Preceptor Handbook has received a refresh! Our Preceptor Liaison will be sending out a copy to all currently approved preceptors and posting it to their Preceptor Information Page, but don't forget to give your preceptor a friendly reminder to review the updated handbook.

#### Licensure in Iowa

New midwives practicing in Iowa are now required to be licensed through the state pursuant to Iowa Code 148I.2

Prior to obtaining a license to practice midwifery, new midwives must meet all of the following requirements:

- 1. Be at least twenty-one years old.
- 2. Submit proof of a high school diploma or its equivalent.
- 3. Submit proof of a current national certification as a certified professional midwife from the North American registry of midwives or its successor organization.
- 4. Submit proof of completion of an educational program or pathway accredited by the midwifery education accreditation council.
- 5. Submit an application fee as prescribed by the board by rule.

All MCU students will meet requirements 2 through 4 and should be qualified for licensure after graduation.



Ruth Ann has designed programming and mentored various venues and ages, including homeschoolers, for nearly thirty years. I hold a Bachelor of Science in Midwifery from the Midwives College of Utah and a Master of Arts in Resilient Leadership. 

In 2003, she became a doula serving mothers in New York City. In 2006, she traveled to Senegal, West Africa to volunteer with the African Birth Collective, and decided then to become a midwife. Since then, Barbara has trained in several states (NY, MA, PA, TX, and NJ). She has served as an advisor to teenage mothers at PathWays PA, an organization that helps women, teens, children, and families achieve economic independence and family well-being. In pursuit of her Graduate Certificate in Maternal and Child Health from Boston University, Barbara conducted workshops in the Boston area on women's, reproductive, infant, and adolescent health. She has led workshops, across the country, on



topics such as racism, motherhood, mental wellness; breastfeeding, and the history of Black midwives within radical birth work. She has also been featured on several social media platforms. To date, she has attended over 300 births since starting her journey in birth work. Barbara desires to provide intentional comprehensive therapeutic continuity of care to families in urban communities and overseas that allows families to feel empowered, honored, and safe. She strongly believes that one's sovereignty is their birthright to birth right. She hopes that her practice will seek to help in the movement of birth equity and sustainability for the midwives and the families they serve to purposefully thrive and not just exist

#### Fun Fact: Dancing is my therapeutic outlet.


I would better ask why midwifery chose me, for I definitely didn't choose it. As I said before in my bio, it is in my bloodline.
